College. In September, we welcomed 156 new first years, all of whom embraced the CCC experience with enthusiasm. We also welcomed our new Deputy Principal, Tommy Brown, who has been a great addition to CCC. We had our first cohort of Leaving Certificate students and welcomed their awareness of, and commitment to, the collaborative effort required to facilitate optimal prospects for their futures. We are delighted to announce the introduction of the newly formed Emergency Response Team in CCC. An advanced first aid responder training course was run last November to enhance the first aid response capabilities of staff. A number of staff volunteered to complete the 3 day intensive course, and following the successful completion of the course, the Emergency Response Team was formed.

Members of the team are trained to assess and manage a patient who has become suddenly ill or injured in the pre-hospital environment until the arrival of emergency medical services, in accordance with Clinical Practice Guidelines.






group. The Hula Hoop rock paper scissors challenge between the first-year class groups and teachers was great fun. Well done, teachers!

This meditation class take place every Friday morning in Ms. Roche's Arts Room (F02) from 8.15am to 8.30am.



Numerous scientific studies have proven that there are benefits many meditation varying from increased academic performance, enhanced positivity and happiness along with reducing student's stress/anxiety levels.

"Meditation helped with clearing my mind of anything negative that had happened during the first half of my day and afterwards it was like a new day had begun that what happened was in the past".








By the amazing organisation and efforts of the CCC Home Economics Department,





Netflix and Chill?

"I am the one who knocks", "By order of the Peaky Blinders...", "How you doin'?".

TV has become a bigger and bigger part of our lives in recent years. So much so that we take quotes from the small screen into our everyday lives in a


way that we used to from the big screen. During lockdown, in order to maintain sanity, subscriptions to streaming platforms grew exponentially and although of many these



services also run movies, the popularity of TV shows exploded to previously unseen levels in Ireland and around the world. From *Tiger King* to *Squid Game* via *Downton Abbey*, television shows via on demand services such as Netflix, Disney Plus and Amazon Prime became a central part of our lives.

This begs a question: has TV has replaced movies? Netflix recently announced a bumper 221.64 million

worldwide subscribers, up 14 million from the previous year. This figure, coupled with total revenues of \$7.686 billion, suggests



that the question is well and truly answered. However, not everyone is on-board with the swing in popularity. According to Martin Scorsese, director of *Raging Bull, Goodfellas* and *The Irishman,* the movie industry is dying as a result of TV's growth. Taking Marvel to task of their movie franchising, Scorsese described the hit movies as "theme parks", adding that the films aren't "real art".

The question remains; what do the students and teachers of Carrigtwohill Community College think? Of the students asked, a whopping 100% chose TV over movies, citing reasons such as convenience, more entertainment and more time

to progress story lines character arcs. From among the teachers. overwhelming 86% would prefer to sit down at home to watch their favourite TV show ahead of the latest movie. What is it that makes the movie, once the staple of cinematic entertainment,


the less attractive option? Let's see what the students and teachers of CCC had to say.

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Thomas F Meagher Flag Day

March 7th 1848 - The day Thomas Francis Meagher first flew a tricolour of green, white and orange. Green signifies Irish Catholics, orange signifies Irish Protestants and white signifies a lasting truce between the two.

To many, the white now signifies much more than peace between Catholics and Protestants. To many, it signifies peace, respect and inclusion of all.

On March 16th we had a ceremony as part of Thomas Francis Meagher Flag Day. Oisín O'Neill - sixth year - read about the meaning and origin of the Irish flag. Ruby Savage and Jamie O'Donovan - both of fifth year - read aloud a copy of the *Proclamation* which Padraig Pearse read on the steps of the GPO

on Easter Monday 1916. On the wall behind our readers is some of the artwork created by our student body on what the Irish flag means to them. Also included is a poem written by second year student, Eliana Moroney. Flag Day provides an opportunity to celebrate the pride, respect and inclusion of the Irish Flag.





What is positive self-talk?

Positive self-talk makes you feel good about yourself and the things that are going on in your life. It's like having an optimistic voice in your head that always looks

on the bright side.

Negative self-talk tends to make you pretty miserable and can even impact on your recovery from mental health difficulties.

Some examples of self-talk

- "I can't do it" change to "I can do it."
- "I am not good enough" change to "I am good enough."
- "I can't" change to "If I want to, I can."
- "It does matter" change to "It doesn't matter if I make a mistake"

How does self-talk improve confidence?

Self-talk is something you do naturally throughout your waking hours. People are becoming more aware that positive self-talk is a powerful tool for increasing your self-confidence and curbing negative emotions. People who can master positive self-talk are thought to be more confident, motivated, and productive.




1st Years 2021-2022

Zip-It


