We have had some fantastic achievements in our school community over the past few months. The class of 2024 were all very happy with their LC results. All at CCC are so proud of all the student's achievements. They performed extremely well and are currently pursuing a variety of college courses across a huge range of third level institutions, FET Courses as well as many different apprenticeships and much more. A special mention must go to Alex Bell who achieved an amazing 625 points as well as later securing a Quercus Entrance Scholarship to UCC. Approx. 25% of our students scored over 500 points

33% of our students scored between 400 - 500 points

58% of our students scored over 400 points

Our Junior Cycle students also showed the fruits of their hard work with their fantastic results in October. Again, I would like to acknowledge the work put in by the student, staff and parents of the school in supporting the students to achieve these results.

Upcoming Events








History Club on the Anniversary of the Fall of the Berlin Wall







Maths Week 2024

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Arabian Nights Tuesday, 17th of December




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BT Young Scientist & Technology Exhibition (BTYSTE)

The BT Young Scientist & Technology Exhibition (BTYSTE) is an annual science and technology competition in Ireland where students showcase innovative projects



The entry portal usually opens in late May or early summer. To enter, you need to establish an idea for a project. It can be as simple as asking yourself a question and conducting one or a series of experiments. For those interested in technology, you could build a functional app, robot, or machine, or research an innovative concept. Your project can be on anything you're curious about!

Once you have your idea, the next step is to outline your proposal, explaining your aims, methodology, and the potential impact of your research.

Don't forget that you can also do an individual or group (2 or 3 people) project. So, you can invite your friends to help you out too.

There are 45 category prizes, over 50 sponsor prizes, and about a hundred highly commended project awards, so taking part in the competition can even turn out profitable.





My participation in the BTYSTE

This year, my passion for STEM and a concern about the lack of STEM professionals in Ireland, especially women, inspired me to develop my project: A statistical analysis and case study on the impact of various STEM promotion events on secondary school students' interest in STEM subjects and careers.

I'm proud to share that it qualified for the exhibition, and I will represent our school from January 8th to 11th in the Individual Junior Social & Behavioural Sciences category.

My study focused on 2nd, 3rd, and 4th-year students and was carried out in three main stages: an initial survey, a series of STEM promotion events, and a final survey.

- 1. Initial Survey In September, I ran a survey to understand the baseline interest in STEM subjects and careers among students. I received 245 responses, which formed the foundation of my research.
- 2. STEM Promotion Events I organised three major events to encourage interest and engagement with STEM:
- o STEM Showcase: Professionals from Enviroguide, the National Space Centre, and ASUS Aerospace spoke to over 155 students, sharing their career journeys and the benefits of STEM careers.
- o Site Visit to GE HealthCare: A group of students visited this pharmaceutical company in our local area. I conducted interviews with attendees to gather deeper insights into their experience.
- o STEM Careers Workshop: I involved 19 Transition Year students, who each researched a specific STEM profession and presented their findings in a career fair format. Over 420 students participated, learning about a wide range of STEM opportunities.

Final Survey and Results After each event, I conducted follow-up surveys to measure the impact and gather feedback. Then I checked my data for statistical significance to determine if the changes are significant. The results showed that my events were successful: students reported an increased interest in STEM, both subjects and careers.

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
Athletics Club

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Visit to China—Méihuā Cup Chinese Learning Competition

After winning the Méihuā Cup Chinese Learning Competition last year, 5th year students Dearbhail Deane, Eva McCabe, and Lily O'Brien-Sarrazin were lucky enough to travel to China over the midterm break to experience a whole new culture. It was my privilege to accompany them and engage in this cultural exchange. Through visiting tourist sites, being welcomed into secondary and primary schools, as well as meeting and conversing with students and teachers, we had the trip of a lifetime representing Carrigtwohill Community College. While it is difficult to articulate the full depth of our experiences, we have tried to summarise some of our trip to share with you all.

The China trip was unlike anything I had experienced before. Nanjing alone has a larger population than Ireland, and its buildings surpass our tallest.

We first visited two massive secondary schools, one resembling a college campus. Both schools take great pride in their image, showcasing student achievements, including one who went to Harvard. The students' English was excellent; they were friendly and gave us lovely gifts. I was amazed by how advanced and well-structured the schools were, especially considering they were public. Education in China is highly valued, and students face immense pressure, studying for hours daily. It made me grateful for Ireland's less intense system.

At the Nanjing Wall, I was fascinated to learn that prisoners who built the wall carved their names and addresses into bricks to avoid punishment if their work was subpar. The views of the large lake, trees, and plants were stunning beyond words.

We also visited a primary school, which had its own farm, greenhouse, and historical artefacts to teach students about their history. I sat in on a lesson where the children were incredibly engaged and well-behaved.

The tour of a park, also a historical site of an emperor's tomb, was beautiful. Statues tied to Chinese mythology were carved from stone, and each had its own story, explained by our helpful guide.

Meeting Nanjing representatives was another highlight, as we enjoyed learning more about the culture and tasting the delicious food. Visiting a temple where people pray for exam success and the Nanjing Massacre Museum were unforgettable. The museum was deeply educational and heart-wrenching. The horrific events showed the importance of learning about history beyond the West to prevent similar tragedies.

This trip opened my eyes to a different culture and its deep history. I am forever grateful for this opportunity and hope to return one day.

Nanjing Visit

My experience at Nanjing Foreign Language School (NFLS) was truly eye-opening. On the smaller campus, I spoke with 12-year-old students who amazed me with their fluency in English. Seeing students' work displayed in the corridors, I understood why so many NFLS graduates attend prestigious universities like Cornell, Yale, Oxford, and Cambridge. I truly admire the dedication and discipline of Chinese students.



Now Christmas nears, with laughter and song, A season of love where we all belong. May peace and warmth in our hearts reside, At CCC, with joy as our guide.




